The National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) hosts many leadership conferences for its juniors every year. By hosting conferences in different locations around the nation, the NJAA hopes to expose junior members to other parts of the country and help them experience agriculture in new ways. Additionally. juniors have opportunities to foster relationships within the industy.

Juniors kicked off the jam-packed weekend with breakout sessions with the National Junior Angus Board of Direcspeaker, Craig Huse, president and co-owner of Huse Culinary. Angus members achieve one million genotypes

Angus members' efforts make Angus Genetics Inc. milestone possible.

Angus Genetics Inc. (AGI), a subsidiary of the American Angus Association®, has reached their 1 millionth mark in Angus genotypes. This was a monumental accomplishment for the Angus breed, says Kelli Retallick-Riley, president of AGI.

"It has taken just a little over a decade for Angus breeders to reach this impressive milestone," said Retallick-Riley. "This is a testament to the pioneer mindset Angus breeders have always hung their hats on. The early adoption of genomic technology has led Angus to this point and will lend to future tools designed specifically for users of registered Angus genetics."


AGI began including genomics in the genetic evaluation in 2010 with the idea of using this technology to enhance accuracy, evaluate for traits at earlier ages and predict difficult-to-measure traits for Angus breeders. In addition to its large genotype database, the American Angus Association is home to the largest beef cattle breed phenotype database in the world. With that knowledge,

the pace of adoption of genomic technology has increased.

In the first four years of collecting genomic samples, AGI hit their first milestone of collecting 100,000 genotypes. In 2018, AGI had another breakthrough of accumulating half a million genotypes. While it took eight years to collect the first 500,000 genotypes, it only took three years to collect the next half of a million. Currently, around 3,000 genotypes enter the evaluation each week.

As for the future of genomic testing at AGI, the company has hopes it can continue to make significant advancements to further enhance the beef cattle industry economically. With this amount of data in hand, AGI is looking at ways to leverage this database to create novel solutions to real-world problems. Retallick-Riley says, Angus producers should be excited about what the future holds.

"The value of genomics is here," said Retallick-Riley. "While we continue to optimize these solutions to ensure accurate genetic tools, I have no doubt that the next ten years with genomics will only continue to drive genetic progress and profitability for our independently owned farming and ranching families."

Join us in September

I think it is safe to say 2021 has been a roller coaster year, to put it lightly. We started out 2021 with the strongest year for production sales since the 2015 sale season. We followed that with a moderate winter, which led us to the current drought situation that so many producers throughout the state are battling.

I will be the first to admit that this drought is the first thing I think about when I wake up in the morning, and typically the same thought that keeps me up at night. As it has weighed heavily on all our minds. I have come to the conclusion that there are three things that we, as producers, might benefit from in the long term.

The first benefit that comes to mind is the annual culling process in our operations. Most of us already cull heavily on many convenience and structural traits, as well as open and late cows. For most, this year will

be a little different than normal. I think it is safe to say that no excuses will be made for any cow on the place. While some will cull much harder based on lack of feed and lack of grass with inflated feed prices, there will come a day that this will benefit you as a producer. Even the best cows aren't perfect, and as you build your herds back up in the next few years as the drought and its effects pass, I truly believe we will all build back on a stronger more maternal cow base with more fleshing ability and fertility.

The second thing I have taken away from this drought is our ability to still truly be cattle-

men. We, without question, have become more attentive than ever to our livestock. Whether it is watching the water situation constantly, making sure cattle are getting proper supplementation on a very strict regimen, or going out and scratching hay together from places you would never even think about cutting on any other given year, I feel this year has maybe been a reminder to others, as well as ourselves, just how much grit and determination we have as cattle producers.

Lastly, it will be a valuable lesson for our future generations. Nearly every rancher and cattleman has been through a few

Jace Stagemeyer becomes the 2021 grandest showman

Members of the National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) all aspire to have the chance to compete for the Champion Showman title at the National Junior Angus Show (NJAS). Jace Stagemeyer of Nebraska had his dream come true as he was named the 2021 NJAS showmanship winner in Grand Island, Neb. on July 17, 2021.

"I said to myself you're either going big or going home, then they announced my name and all my nerves just went away," Stagemeyer said. "Deep down inside I was thrilled. I knew I had the potential to do it, but it comes down to so many little nitty gritty things that are out of my control. I was super thrilled."

Although many junior national shows have a showmanship contest, there are a few factors that come into play that potentially make this the most prestigious showmanship contest of them all. First, to have the opportunity to compete at the NJAS showmanship competition, juniors must be selected by their home state. The juniors that are selected have only one year of eligibility. At NJAS, juniors must compete in preliminary rounds with hopes of being selected as the top 15 showman and women.


The top 5 winners were selected by judges Cody Bock of Illinois; Britney Creamer of Colorado; Susan Henderson-Perry of California; and Bobby Strecker of Colorado. The top 5 winners are awarded each a coveted Silver Revere bowl sponsored by the American Angus Auxiliary. As a part of being selected as the champi-

on showman, the junior member is awarded the Dean Hurlbut Award in honor of the man who began the Angus showmanship competition in 1967

"It was a really humbling experience and I feel really blessed to have even had the opportunity to experience it," Stagemeyer said. "This is probably the premiere showmanship competition in the nation, and to be able to make it to that top spot was a once in a lifetime opportunity – that makes it even more special."

Showmanship exhibitors were evaluated on how they handle their animal, sportsmanship, plus their ability to follow instructions given by the judges. To enhance the contest further, exhibitors were given preselected heifers and switched animals with other exhibitors several times throughout the contest to prove their skills. The rest of the top 5 winners included: second place, Natalie Philips of West Virginia; third place, Chancee Clark of Oklahoma; fourth place, Hannah Tremaine of Wisconsin; and fifth place, Eva Hinrichsen of Kansas.

The National Junior Showmanship displays the best of the best in terms of livestock handling. The Udder Facts: Scoring teat size and udder suspension

There are numerous traits that build a functional female. Many of these set the foundation for the success or failure of that female in production. One of the necessary foundation traits for a female in production is the conformation of the udder. Earlier this summer, the American Angus Association added the option for members to record teat size and udder suspension scores on dams at the time of calving in Login.

It has often been said that we don't know what a perfect udder is, but we sure know a bad one when we have to deal with it. Quality teat and udder confirmation are essential to a productive female. Poor teat or udder quality provides opportunity to cull females and lowers herd productivity. It is no secret newborn calves rely on colostrum from the dam to provide passive immunity until the calf's immune system begins to take over. If the newborn calf is unable to successfully suckle because of poor teat or udder quality, it not only compromises colostrum intake, it also increases labor to assist the calf in nursing or to milk out the udder. Research shows udder characteristics are heritable and improvement can be made with selection pressure. With these phenotypes collected, an EPD for each trait may be able to be built to allow selection pressure or make directional change if a breeder choos-

Following the scoring system from the Beef Improvement Federation, teat size and udder suspension scores are each on a 1 to 9 scale. A teat size score of 1 represents a very large, misshapen teat and a score of 9 represents a very small teat. For udder suspension, a score of 1 represents a very pendulous udder and a score of 9 represents a very tight udder held close to the body cavity.

Unlike the foot scoring system where a 5 for foot angle and a 5 for claw shape represent ideal, these guidelines are not designed to identify the "ideal udder" with a score of 5 for teat size and 5 for udder suspension or 9 for teat size and 9 for udder suspension. The scoring guidelines are meant to represent an objective score for teat size and udder suspension that characterizes differences.

While these traits, teat size and udder suspension, are correlated, they are considered two separate traits. Teat size and udder suspension must be score on the weakest combined quarter of the udder. While these scores are recorded on the combined worst quarter, each trait should be scored independently. Dams should be scored annually without consideration for age. These scores should be taken with 24 hours of calving, ideally before the calf has suckled. For consistency, it is best if the same person scores all females in a management group. These scores can be collected at the same time as calving ease and birth weight.

Members using Information Management Software (AIMS) have been able to record teat size and udder suspension scores. While the scores in AIMS were recorded on a different scale, those scores can be converted to the 1 to 9 scales. Once AIMS has been updated to be able to convert to the 1 to 9 scales, the Association will be reaching out to AIMS users who want to submit historical teat size and udder suspension scores.

Based on the study agriculture, forestry and related industries contribute:

\$32.1 billion to South Dakota's economy which is 29.3 percent of South Dakota's total economic output.

129,753 jobs in South Dakota which is 21.1 percent of all jobs in South Dakota.

\$11.7 billion in total value added including \$5.6 billion from livestock production, \$3.3 billion from corn production, \$2 billion from other agriculture industries, and \$860 million from forestry production.







Architecture and Angus

Sam Hovde grew up on a farm near Willow Lake, S.D. His parents, Brian and Sandra, along with his older brothers, Lane and Spencer, raise Angus and Simmental cattle along with crossbred Boer goats. He also shows pigs competitively.

"I received my first Angus heifer from Hurlbut Cattle Co. out of Raymond, S.D.," Hovde says. "They helped me increase my involvement in the breed and showing cattle.

Hovde has been a member of the South Dakota Jr. Angus Association since he was eight years old and has attended the National Jr. Angus Show four times. He has competed in the judging, sales team and team fitting contests, in addition to showing cattle.

Hovde plans to stay involved in the breed after his show career is over and encourages other youth to get involved because of the many opportunities within the association.

"I enjoy helping younger members and others to join the association," Hovde says. "Being a member teaches one responsibility and gives you friends all over the country."

His most memorable Angus heifer was named Stitches and showed her

"The first time I showed her at the Minnesota Beef Expo, she head-butted me in the ring," Hovde says. "I ended up with seven stitches above my left eye. Over the year we bonded, but she still had her moments where she showed her wild side."

Hovde graduated from Willow Lake High School this past May and plans to attend Mitchel Technical College for architectural design and building construction.

"I have always had a fascination for buildings and math, so I put two and two together to pick my degree," Hovde says. "Mitchell Tech had a bet-

ing and submitting all of the data. Information from pedigree, individual performance, progeny performance and genomics are used in genetic evaluations that result in expected progeny difference (EPD) values for animals registered by the American Angus Associa-

However, Retallick-Rilev expressed concern that some breeders think genomic testing makes ultrasound measurement of carcass data unnecessary. In a presentation made during the 2021 Beef Improvement Federation Research Symposium and Convention, hosted June 22-25 in Des Moines, Iowa, she

reminded her audience that ultrasound provides measurements of carcass traits on large numbers of animals, without waiting for slaughter, and allows collection of phenotypic data on live breeding stock. So ultrasound is important to calculating EPDs for young prospective sires, for example.

"We can't have accurate predictions without the actual phenotypes in the genetic evaluation," emphasized Retallick-Riley. "We need to get ultrasound scans (phenotypes) and add in that layer from genotypes. The reality of the situation is they have to work together."

Retallick-Riley noted how the beef industry has shifted from producing a commodity to being quality-driven. Beef grading USDA Select no longer dominates the meatcase. Illustrating how Choice and better product now dominates, she explained that the Certified Angus Beef® (CAB®) brand alone represented 22% of 2020 production, while Select beef represented 14.4% of the total.

According to Retallick-Riley, marbling EPDs for Angus have trended dramatically higher since the early 2000s. She attributed that to the availability of more carcass records. In 2007, some 150,000 ultrasound carcass records were included in the Angus genetic evaluation. Only lately has collection of these records begun to taper off slightly.

As some breeders question the importance of ultrasound data, AGI has considered what EPD accuracy and genetic trend would look like without it. The AGI president described evaluations performed to estimate the effects if 11 years of ultrasound carcass data were deleted from genetic evaluation. Results suggested the average accuracies for carcass EPDs for young genotyped sires would have decreased by 17% for carcass weight, 16% for ribeye, 14% for marbling and 21% for fat. For older sires having more progeny carcass data, accuracies of carcass EPDs also would decrease by more than 10% in most cases.

"The result would be less accurate EPDs and slower genetic progress," Retallick-Riley stated again. "Carcass ultrasound data is important."
