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Breed Beat

Adding Additional Tools to the Maternal Selection Toolbox

In the suite of traits to improve maternal function, good udder structure plays an important role in beef production. Even though milk is not the end product from a beef production system, good udder structure is related to cow longevity and health, as well as calf survival and growth from birth to weaning.

To characterize udder structure, the American Angus Association has scoring guidelines to help producers evaluate their cow herd. The scores are taken within 24 hours of birth of the calf and can be taken for every calf a cow births. The visual assessment of teat size (TEAT) and udder suspension (UDDR) should be reported on the combined weakest quarter and one person should score all the females within the same management group.

Both scores are on a scale from 1 to 9, where a score of one represents a very large and misshapen teat, or a very pendulous udder, while a nine indicates a very small teat size or a very tight udder.

For the research and development of the research expected progeny difference (EPD) for teat size and udder suspension, phenotypic records, alongside pedigrees and genotypes are incorporated in the single-step genetic evaluation model.

There were more than 148,000 records for each TEAT and UDDR scores collected from more than 87,000 individual cows included. The number of records is larger than the number of cows as a cow can have multiple records during her lifetime.

Overall, both teat and udder scores have an average of 6.6 and range from 1 to 9, representing the entire scoring scale.

For teat size and udder suspension, extremes on either end of the scales

are undesirable. Large teats can prevent a calf from suckling and proper intakes of colostrum, and large/pendulous udders can cause problems like mastitis; on the other hand, very small teats can also result in a calf that can't properly nurse and very tight udders may be associated with low milk production, resulting in poor calf development.

Modeling and genetic parameters estimation

To estimate heritabilities, genetic correlations and develop a research EPD, the first step is to identify the sources of non-genetic variation that affect a phenotype and develop the statistical model for the traits. For teat size and udder suspension, the contemporary group accounts for environmental and management differences, and the age of the cow is also considered for both traits.

Both teat size and udder suspension are moderately heritable traits (0.32 and 0.28, respectively). The traits have a genetic correlation of 0.77 which supports modeling them together in a multiple trait model.

Research EPD

The teat size and udder suspension research EPD are expressed in the units of teat and udder scores. These EPDs predict expected differences in teat size and udder suspension scores when comparing progeny of different individuals under similar mating and raised on the same conditions.

Teat Size EPD (TEAT) is expressed in units of teat size score, with a higher EPD indicating smaller teats. The teat size scores range from 9 (very small) to 1 (very large, balloon shaped). Longer, thicker teats inhibit calf suckling which could decrease the intake of colostrum and increase the risk of pre-weaning mortality.

Udder Suspension EPD (UDDR), expressed in units of udder suspension score with a higher EPD indicating tighter udder suspension. The udder suspension scores range from 9 (very tight) to 1 (very pendulous). Weak suspension (low scores) indicates lack of support

to the ligament that ties the udder to the cow's body all allowing the udder to hang low subject the udder to increased injury or other issues.

While overall smaller teats and tighter udders tend to result in less problems, breeders need to consider making breeding decisions to avoid extremes on either end of the scale. In this context, while higher EPDs would lead to smaller teats and tighter udders over generations, caution is needed not to

push the herd towards an undesirable extreme.

The average EPD for both traits is around 0.52 ranging from -0.6 to 1.51. From largest to smallest there is a range of over two scores, which shows the variation in the population allowing breeders to make selection decisions that fit their breeding programs.

Conclusion

These two new research EPDs will even further expand the American Angus breeder's toolbox to improve maternal function. Con-

tinued data reporting is encouraged as these new EPDs develop and the database expands. The development of the teat and udder research EPDs includes phenotypic data alongside pedigrees and genotypes in the single-step model.

The teat size and udder suspension research EPDs were released August 22, 2024.

In addition to the South Dakota Angus Tour to be held on Sept. 22-24, two nearby states will also be hosting Angus tours.

Montana will have its tour on Sept. 17-19 in Lewistown. Nebraska's Angus Tour will be held Sept. 20-21 near Crete, Nebraska.

Australian Angus Group Stays Away from U.S. Genetics

A group of Angus seedstock producers has broken away from the Angus Australia breed society ranks, forming their own association intent on protecting Australian Angus

breed genetics from the influence of North American imports.

The Aberdeen Angus Breeders Association currently numbers around ten Australian seedstock producers, who collectively manage between 5000 and 10,000 registered and commercial breeding cows. All carry no North American bloodlines. Several members can trace their studs' origins back to the early 1900s and late 1880s.

Inaugural AABA president Paul Favaloro from Oakey Creek Angus near Tamworth said there had been no great 'falling out' with Angus Australia, but the group had concerns about the accuracy and methodology behind the use of BreedPlan and the genetic influence of U.S. Angus.

Railroad Pie

Ingredients

- 1 pound ground beef
- 1 small onion, diced
- A pinch of salt
- A pinch of black pepper
- 1 (15-ounce) can Ranch-style beans, drained (see note below)
- 1 (14.5-ounce) can diced tomatoes or Ro-Tel diced tomatoes with chiles
- 2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
- 1-1/2 teaspoons chili powder
- 1 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1 teaspoon onion powder
- 2/3 cup shredded cheddar or Mexican blend cheese
- For the cornbread:
- 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup cornmeal
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 large egg, beaten
- 1/2 cup buttermilk or 2% milk
- 1 tablespoon vegetable oil
- 1/4 cup diced jalapenos or diced green chiles (optional)



Directions

Step 1: Cook beef and onions

Preheat the oven to 425°F. Spray an 11×7-inch or 8-inch square baking dish with nonstick spray.

Heat a large skillet over medium heat; crumble the ground beef and add the diced onions. Sprinkle a pinch of salt and black pepper into the pan. Cook, stirring occasionally until the beef is browned. Pour off any excess grease.

Step 2: Simmer the mixture

Add to the pan the beans, diced tomatoes, Worcestershire sauce, chili powder, garlic powder and onion powder; stir everything together. Reduce the heat slightly and simmer the mixture for about five minutes. Add another dash of salt and pepper to taste. Remove the pan from the heat and spoon the beef mixture into the bottom of the prepared baking dish.

Step 3: Make the cornbread batter

Add the flour, cornmeal, sugar, baking powder and salt to a medium bowl, and blend them together. Add in the egg, buttermilk and vegetable oil. Stir the ingredients just until they come together. Fold in the diced jalapenos.

Step 4: Assemble and bake

Sprinkle the shredded cheese over the ground beef mixture, then spoon the cornbread batter into an even layer over the top. Bake the casserole for 15-20 minutes until the beef and cheese are bubbling and the cornbread is baked through. Serve slices of Railroad Pie immediately with sour cream and salsa

AngusLink releases Maternal Score as marketing tool for replacement heifers

AngusLink's Genetic Merit Scorecard (GMS) adds a fourth score option, Maternal, to demonstrate the maternal weaned calf value to aid in the selection of replacement females.

As the cattle industry prepares for herd rebuilding, a new tool for objectively describing the genetic potential of replacement females hits the market and with it an opportunity for producers selling replacement females to market their added genetic value. The AngusLinkSM Genetic Merit ScorecardSM (GMS) draws on the industry's largest database to evaluate the genetic merit of a pen of feeder cattle, and starting in June, its new Maternal Score demonstrates an enrollment group's maternal weaned calf value to aid in the selection of replacement females.

"The Maternal Score is becoming available at a perfect time with herd expansion on the horizon," said Troy Marshall, director of commercial industry relations with the American Angus Association®. "Maternal traits are generally more difficult to quan-

tify because of the need to match cows to their environment, so it's going to be a valuable tool for producers marketing or purchasing replacement females."

The Maternal Score will be displayed alongside other scores – Beef, Feedlot and Grid – on the GMS as females are marketed.

Marshall continued, "This new tool provides a reliable way to compare cattle's performance potential across our industry and rebuild with better genetics that are more closely aligned with targets that the marketplace has clearly defined: increase in efficiency and increase in the consumers' eating satisfaction, primarily through increased marbling and quality grade."

John Dickinson of Parnell Dickinson Inc., Auburn, Calif., is one of the Association's board members.

"I see the same evolution coming with the Maternal Score that we have witnessed the past few years with Beef, Feedlot, and Grid scores already on the GMS," Dickinson said. "In today's marketing landscape, reputation and

historical data are still very important, but buyers also want more tools they can use to mitigate risk."

Information about individual component traits, specifically for mature size and milk production, will also be shared alongside an enrollment group's Maternal Score; so, producers can better understand how a group of cattle would match with their environmental conditions. Dickinson said this appeals to both buyers and sellers because they can dive into individual maternal components.

"This is really exciting as the GMS Maternal Score is not only the first predictor of its kind in the industry, but also can you think of a better time for this tool to become available than when we have the smallest inventory numbers in over 50 years?" Dickinson said. "We will see a re-build and retention soon, and the Maternal Score can play a large role in moving you to the front of the market."

To enroll, a producer must be AngusVerifiedSM through IMI Global, providing a list of sire registration numbers.

Unique to the Maternal Score, the cattle must also have a predominantly Angus cow base.


There is no additional cost associated with the GMS program or Angus-VerifiedSM, aside from IMI Global's Age and Source verification enrollment, which includes an EID tag.

"There's a lot of science behind this scorecard," said Rafael Medeiros, geneticist with Angus Genetics Inc. (AGI®).

Scores are determined by the average EPDs of the bulls used to sire the current enrollment group and the cow herd's genetic makeup. To raise cattle's Maternal Score, a producer would want to select for higher Maternal Weaned Calf Value (\$M) on registered Angus sires.

Medeiros, who led the technical development of the new score, said this prediction tool uses similar rationale to other genetic prediction tools managed by AGI®, and is supported by Angus sire data and data from the USDA's U.S. Meat Animal Research Center breed averages.

"If you're not genotyping, this is the best estimate and the best value," he said.

Medeiros added it is important to know that like the other GMS values, the Maternal Score characterizes the enrolled group, not individual animals. In this way, the program can also serve as an instrument to track a herd's genetic progress to make sure the next calf crop is better than the last.

As a seedstock producer, Dickinson said he sees the Maternal Score as another profit-minded program he and other members of the Association can offer their customers.

"This is yet another service we are providing for our commercial customers and those continuing to pay a premium for registered Angus bulls," he

said. "We are committed to their success and profitability being a pathway to our own. When they build back, we want them to build back with Angus – not necessarily because of reputation or nostalgia, but because we can provide them with the highest quality and most accurate tools for production and management in the industry today."

1-6 in Madison, Wisconsin. Exhibitors were encouraged to "Take the Pledge" and commit to taking advantage of BEEF Academy's online learning modules. There was also a fun display in the trade show area that attendees of NJAS used for a selfie backdrop and for a chance to win prizes. Then, a ceremonial ribbon cutting was held on July 6 with representatives from supporting organizations.

"It was a really rewarding experience growing up in the junior Angus association," said Jason Upchurch, a managing partner at Ingram Angus who took part in the ribbon cutting. "It was just an honor to be able to stand there and give back to the program that built the Angus relationships I have today."

Upchurch said their decision to support the project was truly a team effort.

"Orrin [Ingram], David [Cagle] and I all work as a team at everything we do," he said. "Orrin is very giving person, who loves youth and loves hardworking kids that

put forth effort to make something out of themselves. With that combination along with Dave and I's background, being part of the Angus juniors as we grew up, we felt like it was important to combine forces. We put our minds and resources together to have the ability to do something like this that gives junior members another tool to be able to gain knowledge about our industry."

In the first set of modules, junior members learn about the five beef industry segments, and how they both compete and work together as part of our dynamic beef industry. Later this year, new topics will be added, including beef breeds & genetics and beef science.

Perrier, who helped pilot the program in the spring of 2024, said the content easily builds connections with learners.

"There's a lot of visual parts within the program that do a good job of catching your eye and giving you something that sticks with you," he said. "It's not just a bunch of quizzes or lecturing. It's actually graphic models,

facts and stuff that shows regions it affects, which I think even amplifies the ties it builds with the people using it."

Beef industry professionals help ensure the platform's information is relevant and uniquely tailored to be a go-to resource. Experts including meat scientists, geneticists, and animal science professors continue to aid in the development of additional courses.

"It's a great way to learn and do more and become more involved in the Angus breed or cattle business," said NJAA member Cooper Murnin of Pompeys Pillar, Montana. "I enjoyed the imag-

ery of it. It all tied in really well."

The online learning experience caters to youth ages 8-21 and breaks content into 10-minute modules within three age categories.

Briella Humpert of Windthorst, Texas participated in the pilot test in the youngest age category. She said she thinks it is important for her and her peers to know about the beef industry for themselves, and the interactive knowledge checks were her favorite.

"I like how you had to match what you heard," Humpert said.

Update: Angus Sire Evaluation

This past spring, alongside the routine annual updates of economic assumptions and genomic scores, significant enhancements were implemented in the Sire Evaluation Report and National Cattle Evaluation.

The Sire Evaluation Report is the biannual report run to update the main and supplemental sire lists, breed averages, percentile ranks and more.

Carcass weight, ribeye area and fat

The enhancements include updates to the carcass model and its genetic parameters, including heritability estimates and genetic correlations.

This carcass model update involves the modeling of the ultrasound fat thickness and ultrasound ribeye area records in the evaluation. Previously, records for animals of different sexes (bulls, cows, and steers) were modeled as separate traits. In 2017, cows and steers were condensed into one trait, and now the Angus Genetics Inc. (AGI®) team will condense the ultrasound traits again by placing all three sexes into one singular ultrasound phenotype. This

reduces the model from nine traits to seven traits.

"Our research shows accounting for the sex within a contemporary group yields the same prediction accuracy as the previous model while reducing the model's complexity, which is important for an on-time delivery of the weekly genetic evaluation," said André Garcia, senior geneticist with AGI®.

An updated model also means an update to the genetic parameters inside this genetic evaluation.

"This is necessary because we are changing the make-up of the model, which warrants updated variance components. Not to mention, over time the population changes and evolves due to selection," Garcia said. "As more phenotypes are collected, the variances, heritability estimates, and genetic correlations change. By updating genetic parameters regularly, we can accurately estimate the genetic variation in the population and the relationships between traits."

In multiple trait models, as is the case with the carcass evaluation, accurately estimating the genetic correlations between traits is crucial to take advantage of the accuracy that correlated

phenotypes bring. This is particularly true of ultrasound records, Garcia said.

Continuous research and the implementation of regular updates ensure accurate and unbiased genetic evaluations are delivered on time. These updated estimates are online and in the 2024 Fall Sire Evaluation Report.

Economic assumption updates

Annually, the bio-economic model driving the Association's \$Values undergoes annual updates, utilizing data from CattleFax. Economic assumptions are averaged over the previous seven years for stability, with the 2024 assumptions based on data from 2017 to 2023.

"This long-term perspective mitigates market volatility and aligns with the average cattle cycle," said Esther Tarpoff, director of performance programs.

The May 2024 updates accounted for rising weaned calf sale prices and ration costs. In May 2023, the average weaned calf price was \$167 per cwt. for steer calves and \$152 per cwt. for heifer calves. The update increases the average calf

price to \$182 per cwt. for steer calves and \$164 per cwt. for heifer calves.

Ration costs in the feedlot also increased from \$199 to \$225 per ton, affecting feed costs in the cow-calf sector. These changes influence the outcome of the maternal weaned calf value (\$M), where calf price relative to cow cost stays the major revenue driver.

The average price per hundred for a fed steer delivered and dressed increased from \$192 per cwt. to \$206 per cwt. from 2023-2024. This shift redirects economic weight in beef value (\$B) towards weight traits like carcass weight and postweaning gain and away from grid premiums, which only saw a slight increase. Despite the significant increase in fed cattle prices and minimal changes in quality premiums, overall changes in \$B are minimal.

Producers might notice a slight re-ranking favoring cattle excelling in feedlot value \$F over those at the top of the \$B ranks to their \$G, Tarpoff said. Some individual animals experienced changes, with the largest decreases in \$M, \$B, and \$C being -\$4, -\$6, and -\$9, respectively across the 4,146 current sires.

"Changes in \$Values will be less likely due to economic assumption updates and more likely due to changes in individual EPDs from other evaluation updates," she said. "Overall, updates didn't substantially alter individual \$Values, with economic assumption updates resulting in correlations above 0.99."

Annual genomic scores update

Genomic scores are also updated annually. This process involves updating SNP effects for each trait based on additional phenotypes and genotypes from the previous year.

The May 2024 update included a larger reference population (n=1,593,532), which genomic scores are ranked against. With an increased number of genotyped animals, the reference population grows, leading to re-ranking. Genomic scores are a by-product of genetic evaluation and are updated alongside EPDs.

"It's preferable to use genomically-enhanced EPDs for selection decisions, with genomic score updates not affecting EPDs themselves," Retallick-Riley said.

Phenotypic trait updates

Since 2021, phenotypic traits submitted to Angus Herd Improvement Records (AHIR®) were listed in a variety of places, including the performance registration certificate and EPD/Pedigree Look-up. Adding these traits provides visibility to members submitting phenotypes on animals and continues to fuel genetic evaluation.

Taking it one step further, some phenotypes will be bolded in the list while others are not. This differentiates what phenotypes are included in the genetic evaluation and which traits are not. The phenotypes included in the genetic evaluation helped to inform the predictions for EPDs.

Heifer Pregnancy contemporary groups

Updates made to the heifer pregnancy contemporary groups aim to better characterize weather and environmental conditions that could affect heifer pregnancy outcomes.

"Contemporary groups play a significant role in any genetic evaluation, accounting for non-genetic sources of variation that affected an animal's phenotype," Garcia said. "This update leads to a more accurate and less biased heifer pregnancy genetic evaluation."

Pollard Farms of Waukomis, Okla., will donate the 2025 Angus Foundation Heifer Package in support of furthering education, youth and research. The heifer, Pollard Rita 4012 (AAA* 20875621), is a daughter of EXAR Cover the Bases 0819B and out of a productive, young two-year-old that is on her way to the donor pen; she stems from the PF W34 Rita 4139, a long-time donor in the Pollard program.

The heifer will sell at the National Angus Bull Sale on January 10, at the 2025 Cattlemen's Congress in Oklahoma City. "I am honored to donate the Angus Foundation Heifer Package this year," said Dr. Barry Pollard of Pollard Farms. "I think it is an excellent opportunity for me to offer a fine animal for sale to help raise money for the Angus Foundation and the junior program."

He continued, "The

Angus Foundation plays an important role in our industry as it is our gateway to the youth. The Foundation is the vehicle to better themselves, to grow and to excel in our world. That is what it is all about, so I am happy to support it."

Pollard Farms is owned by Pollard and his wife Roxanne. Together they have five children and 10 grandchildren.

"It is a huge honor to have Pollard Farms as donors of the 2025 Heifer Package," said Jaclyn Boester, Angus Foundation executive director. "Dr. Pollard and Roxanne have been huge supporters of the Angus Foundation and advancing it's mission."

Pollard says his passion for agriculture began in Hennessey, Okla., where he was raised, and where he worked alongside his father and family.

"Growing up, I always envisioned spending

more time in agriculture," he said. "All of my family are farmers and ranchers. I grew up showing animals and in agriculture. My upbringing was an important part of my life, and I loved that part of my life."

Pollard always desired to return to agriculture but first he pursued a career outside of the industry. He attended Oklahoma State University and Oklahoma University to become a board-certified neurosurgeon. In 1982, Pollard moved to Enid, Okla.

where he opened a medical practice.

"Moving to Enid for my practice allowed me to get back to an agriculture community and allowed me to raise my children in rural America," Pollard said. "It was important to me as we started to think about raising a family that we raised them in agriculture."

Preheat oven to 350F. Heat a large non-stick skillet over medium-high heat. When hot, add 1 tbsp olive oil and cook eggplant slices for about 5 minutes on each side and set aside. Cook them in batches and add some olive oil when necessary.

While eggplants are cooking, prepare the beef mixture. Heat another skillet over medium heat and add 1 tbsp olive oil. Cook garlic for about 1 minute (do not let it brown), then add ground beef and break it into pieces with a wooden spatula.

Cook for about 5 minutes and add marinara sauce. Stir well and cook another 5 minutes. Season with salt and pepper. Remove from heat and add basil. Drain excess liquid to make sure you don't end up with a soggy casserole.

In a baking dish (I used a square baking dish), arrange one layer of eggplant, one layer of beef mixture and one layer of parmesan cheese. Repeat (eggplant, then beef, then parmesan) and finish with a layer of eggplant.

Top with mozzarella cheese and bake for 25 minutes or until cheese is golden brown and starts to be crispy. Serve immediately.

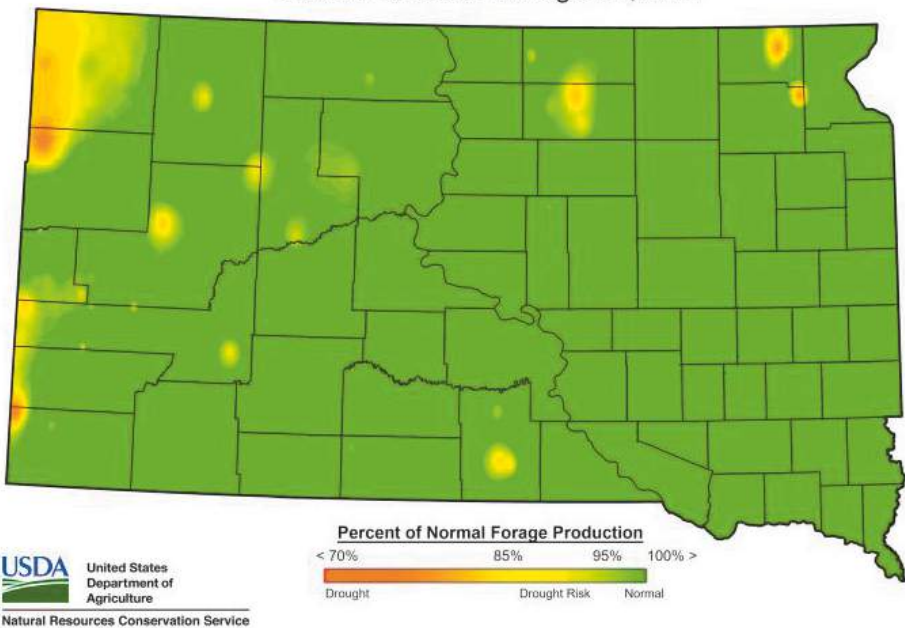
